Coronavirus and the Oncology Office

Cancer patients frequently do not have the option of deferring treatments, so oncology offices have run with little interruption during the Shelter at Home orders.

At press time (end of April) we will have seen more than 1,100 patients since the start of quarantine, which by sheer number has increased our chances of exposure.

However, we take every precautionary measure to make the office safe for staff and patients. COVID tests are done to ensure everyone's safety from the possibility of exposure. N95 masks are worn by staff whenever patients are in the office. We are physically distanced and wash our hands many times throughout the day. In the examination rooms, our protocol is to wash hands 3 times per patient encounter.

Research, LungMap Trial by David Palchak, MD



Cancer is an acquired genetic disease caused by mistakes copying genes that regulate cell division.

Over the last few decades, many of the

genes that cause cancers have been identified. These genes encode enzymes or hormones that "turn on" cell division or proteins that help cancers evade the immune system.

We have treatments aimed at some of the enzymes, hormones and immune traits that cancers use, but are just starting to learn how to combine them.

The LungMap trial is aimed at individuals with stage IV non-small cell lung cancer receiving a standard treatment. Eligible and interested patients have cancers analyzed to determine the enzymes, hormones and immune traits driving their growth. If their initial treatment becomes ineffective, the NCI chooses a treatment(s) devised for the genetic makeup of their tumor, often combining classes of treatments.

We are screening our first patient for this trial. This patient is very happy to have the treatment option of a nonchemotherapy clinical trial.



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We wipe down all touched surfaces with antiseptic after every patient and wear personal protective equipment (PPE) when collecting COVID-19 specimens. Windows remain open to draw clean air in and the pharmacy exhaust fan remains on all day to blow out air throughout the day. So far none of our staff have been infected.

Similar precautions should be taken in homes and the use of masks should be worn when out in the community and among the general public.
